

## Cereal Box Book Report

Create and decorate a real cereal box with illustrations and information related to your chosen AR book!

FRONT OF BOX: Invent a new original name for your cereal that is related to your AR book and sounds like a cereal. Do not use the exact title of the book. Choose a shape for the cereal as well as colors and ingredients that relate to your book. For example, for The Cat in the Hat, you might invent a cereal called Crunchy Cats, a toasted oat cereal in the shape of miniature hats. Create and decorate a cover for your cereal box using a piece of white or light colored paper. Include the name and picture of your cereal written and drawn artistically. When you are finished decorating your cover, paste it to the front of your cereal box.

**Characters** and **Setting**. Under the heading "Ingredients," identify the protagonist and antagonist in your book and state why that character is a **protagonist** or **antagonist** in a **complete sentence**. Then describe the setting in one or two complete sentences. **Remember the setting includes two parts:** when and where. (You may make a flap if you run out of space on the template.)

**LEFT SIDE:** Use the attached template to write a **paragraph about the story plot.** Your paragraph should be indented, exactly 5 sentences in length, and contain all parts of the plot diagram below. For example: the first sentence of your paragraph should be the exposition of the story and include the character, setting and conflict of the story.



**BACK OF BOX:** Design a game that is based on the story. It can be a puzzle, a word search, a word scramble, a maze, a crossword puzzle, a hidden pictures illustration, or any other fun activity that might be found on the back of a cereal box. Make sure your game relates to your book and includes information from the book.

**TOP OF BOX:** Include the title, author, number of pages, and number of stars you would give this book if you were a book critic. The maximum number of stars would be 5. Please use the template provided.

**PRIZE:** Cereal boxes often include a prize. Get creative and think of a prize that the main character could have used in the book or something that reminds you of the main character. You can even include a picture of the prize on the front of your box to let the reader know what is inside the box.

All cereal box book reports are due on **Friday, May 13th**. Students will be presenting their report to the class. Projects will be graded on both the cereal box book report and the short presentation.
